Curriculum (LA)

- By the end of the year, read and comprehend literature, including stories, dramas, and poems, in the grades 6-8 text complexity band proficiently, with scaffolding as needed at the high end of the range.
- By the end of the year, read and comprehend literary nonfiction in the grades 6-8 text complexity band proficiently, with scaffolding as needed at the high end of the range.
- Write routinely over extended time frames (time for research, reflection, and revision) and shorter time frames (a single sitting or a day or two) for a range of discipline-specific tasks, purposes, and audiences.
- Adapt speech to a variety of contexts and tasks, demonstrating command of formal English when indicated or appropriate.
- Acquire and use accurately grade-appropriate general academic and domain-specific words and phrases; gather vocabulary knowledge when considering a word or phrase important to comprehension or expression.

Curriculum (Social Studies)

With American History as the focus, the eighth-grade year begins with a unit on the Constitution. Students learn about our system of government and what it means to be a citizen of the United States. There is an emphasis on events, economics, and movements of the 19th and 20th centuries and their impact today. Topics include the Civil War and Reconstruction, the Second Industrial Revolution and the Emergence of Modern America, the Great Depression, and World War II and the Postwar Period. Students make connections to local history through the extensive use of primary source materials. Geography activities and current events are integrated throughout the year.
